Brave Cohassians Save the Hill!



June 20, 2022 3:30pm. Smoke has been spotted on the east side of Cohasset Ridge, going down towards Forest Ranch, by a GMRS member in Forest Ranch. Their 911 call, led to full air support including 2 helicopters, planes, 2 Cal-Fire trucks, a bulldozer, and Cal-Fire hand crews headed to the scene. By the time that most of the fire support made it there, a group of brave Cohassians had the fire out. They call themselves the **Musty Buck Volunteer Fire Dept.** and they were led by the Autrey family. When Jamie Autrey



heard the helicopters and smelled smoke, he had his wife, Rita alert neighbors and enlisted the help of his son Justin. With their two water trucks, and some awesome neighbors, they attacked the fire and had it out before Cal-Fire arrived some 45 minutes later.

Even with 2 helicopters circling overhead, the Cal-Fire trucks were not able to find the location. Thankfully, Arlo Cartlidge drove out and found them and led them in. This brings up the serious question of why GPS coordinates would not work in this situation. If conditions had been worse, the fire could have spread quickly and endangered the lives of these brave folks.

Jamey attributes the success to putting it out to his and Justin's water trucks. He says: "putting water down on a fire makes for quick work of getting these seriously dangerous situations under control. If more people on the hill were equipped with a water truck, we would all be safer".



Butte County, Ca--The Butte County Office of Emergency Management is excited to announce the Butte County Drought Assistance Program, which will provide drinking water deliveries to residents without access to clean water.

The first phase of the project will provide up to 5000 gallons per month per household for residents who have a storage tank. The second phase will provide temporary storage tanks to residents who don't have them already installed.

it has been hard to come up with a date that works for all.

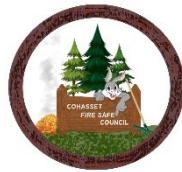

Cohasset Fire Safe Council (CFSC)



The Graham Fire certainly drove home the point that fire season is year-round at this point. On the heels of the Graham Fire we had a lightning strike fire off Musty Buck. I have been in Cohasset for 35 years, and this is the earliest that I can remember fires starting. I was ready. Were you?

The CFSC has been busy with meetings and keynote speakers to help everyone in Cohasset understand the need for preparing for wildfires. At the last CFSC meeting, on June 15th, Jim Houtman spoke about the grants available up here, and the progress being made with that grant money. Then Russell Nickerson and Nick Bunch from the US Forest Service did a recap of the Graham Fire. They explained the response from start to finish. It was an eye-opening meeting.

On June 23 Judith Schreuder and I met with Josh Jimerfield and Angie Mantel from the Butte County Office of Emergency Management. We discussed the importance of early and accurate information during a fire. All agree that with only one road in/out our community needs accurate information on a regular basis in order to determine when to start moving our possessions, equipment, and livestock off the hill.

I do have some exciting news to share with you. The Butte County Office of Emergency Management (BSOEM) informed us that there is a Federal grant com-

ing up that **might** fund a siren system for Cohasset!!!! When I investigated this about 4 years ago, the cost was prohibitive for our small community. Not only is the initial cost out of our price range, but the maintenance of the system is off the charts as well. IF Butte County can secure, through this grant, the money to install a siren system, it will go a long way to help with the much-needed evacuation warning system up here. This will be a slow process, to say the least. First we have to qualify for the grant. Then the grant must be funded. Then the process of location, excavating, and permits can begin. So, we're probably looking at about 3 years or more down the road. I know we need this system now, but it's a start. Angie, from the BCOEM, will be at the CFSC will be at the next CFSC meeting on July 20th, and at the CFSC booth during the Cohasset Bazaar in August. Please stop by for either or both and have your questions answered.

Other exciting news is that the USFS will be attending our bazaar this year. They are bringing Smokey the Bear and a vehicle for our parade. BCFSC should have Ready Raccoon. Our own CFSC will have Harey the Prepared Hare. So, come out and see the parade and then stop by the CFSC series of booths. There will be many experts there to answer all your questions.

The next meeting of the CFSC is scheduled for July 20th at 6pm at the CCA. Angie, from the BCOEM, will be there to speak to everyone about the various concerns for fire, communication issues, and evacuation recommendations on our ridge. You won't want to miss this meeting!

Be prepared. Be safe. Be vigilant.

The following is an abridged article about the Cohasset Cemetery, written by Audrey Sorenson. Next time you visit, see if you can find some of the colorful Cohassians mentioned in the article!

In 1880 Carl B. Hume, four year old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Hume, died and his parents buried the child on a portion to their homestead. The location is at the end of Harvey Road amid pines, oaks and cedars on a fairly level site. Just opposite this site, the church was built in 1897. It was a handsome structure with Gothic windows and a small steeple. During WWII it was vandalized for building material. John E. Hammond was killed in 1888 by a log rolling out of control while it was being loaded in the woods. He was buried near the Hume child. The heart of the sugar pine log, which killed Hammond could be seen until recently near the road, a short distance above the line between Butte and Tehama Counties, and was known as the Hammond Log. By 1900, Mr. Hume had passed away and Mrs. Hume had married a Mr. Pappert. The community felt the need at the time to organize a regular cemetery association. Mrs. Pappert deeded for one dollar (\$1.00) the land about 1.2 acres to the Mount Pleasant Cemetery Association. For many years, the map of the cemetery was passed from one elder of the community to the next, and was formally cared for by the community and families of those buried there. Customarily, this was done on the weekend before Decoration Day, now known as Memorial Day.

Cohasset Cemetery History

Ira Schofield was caretaker in the early part of the century, spending many hours looking after the cleaning of the grounds. He was a Civil War Veteran with a steel plate in his head. The next caretaker of the cemetery was Harry Bodey, who came to Cohasset in the early 1920's to be near family. Two uncles and a niece are buried in the cemetery. He was struck by a car in Chico, was killed instantly, and is buried in Cohasset Cemetery near his uncles. Upon Mr. Bodey's death in 1959, Donald Sorenson received the map, and helped with selections of grave sites. He took what responsibility was necessary for the care of the cemetery. In 1972, residents of long standing encouraged Mr. Sorenson to reactivate the Mount Pleasant Cemetery Association with the view of setting forth some rules and regulations so that the affairs of the cemetery would run smoothly.

James Kidwell spent many hours remapping the cemetery, as through the years grave locations didn't always match plot site of the original map. At that time, his new map showed 215 graves.

Ira Hume, whose grandparents were the founders of the cemetery has donated a flag pole and flag in memory of his father Harry Hume, who was city manager of Chico for 21 years. Harry was born in Cohasset and is buried in the family plot. The flag and pole were dedicated on Memorial Day, 1976.



GRAHAM FIRE—COHASSET IN THE CROSSHAIRS

On Friday, June 10th at approximately 6:15 pm a call went out for a full wildland fire response over the scanner for Cal Fire. A smoke was seen by 2 private airplane pilots about 5 miles north of Cohasset and 7 miles west of Butte Meadows. Only 3 minutes later the smoke became visible from the valley and on an alert wildfire camera.

The fire was located near the boundary line of the Ishi Wilderness and Lassen National Forest. A request was made to use mechanized equipment to assist in fighting the fire in the Wilderness area. The request was granted to allow chain saws and drop retardant. The initial size was approximately 30 acres with a moderate rate of spread.

Soon both Forest Service and Cal Fire fire engines, water tenders and crew trucks began to pass our homes here in Cohasset on their way to the only access for the fire – Campbellville. A crew of smoke-jumpers out of Redding were dropped into the fire to begin their assault. By 8:00pm the fire was at 50 acres, with a potential of growing to several hundred acres.

Sleep eluded many of us while we waited for morning and the expected wind shift. Your Cohasset GMRS radio group was searching out information and relaying what they could find or were seeing. Early Saturday, June 11th, I received a text message from Lt. Collins. He had checked with Cal Fire and the fire hadn't grown much overnight, from 50 acres to 75 acres, and should anything change concerning Cohasset, he would let us know right away. That was great news, but we were under an Excessive Heat Advisory and still very concerned about the possible winds coming up.

Due to this being a Lassen National Forest fire, it was nearly impossible to track down updates. Nearly everyone in the GMRS radio club, along with several people on Facebook, were scouring the internet for information and putting the information out over the GMRS radios and then Facebook Tankers were hitting the fire on the east side, closest to Campbellville, with everything they had, while helicopters made drops on the west edge. Crews were getting dropped down into the landing zone by the fire. By Saturday, we had 7 Hot Shot crews, 1 Strike Team of Engines, which consists of 5 Engines, in Campbellville for possible structure protection, 2 Type 2 Helicopters and 1 type 1 Helicopter. 3 Dozers were also

working to cut a secondary line on Campbell Ridge for a backup should the fire reach that point.

Sunday, June 12, dawned and the significant anticipated winds that had been expected did not materialize. The fire was held to only 153 acres and received a bit of rain over night. Crews were working hard to reinforce containment lines and eliminating hot spots. By Monday, June 13th, there were 381 Personnel, 7 Hand Crews, 7 Helicopters, 12 Engines and 1 Bulldozer working on the fire. The fire only grew from 153 acres to 177 acres overnight with 30% containment. Humidity was higher, temperatures mid to high 70's, but winds were expected to increase. The helicopters continued to make drops and the crews increased their containment lines. Some of the Forest Service Engines started to leave and head back down the hill. Significant progress had been made and their containment lines were holding.

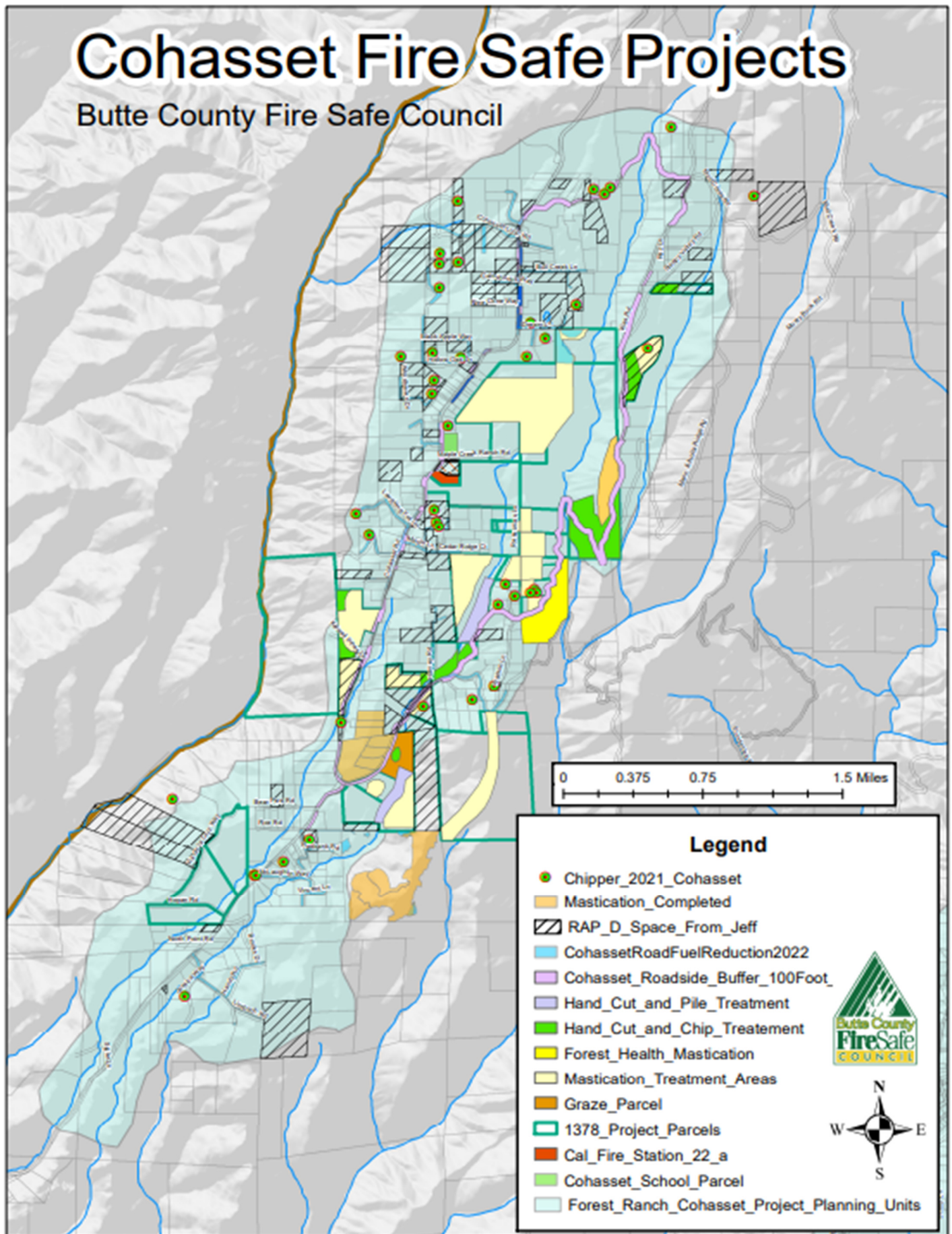
By Tuesday, June 14, the fire was still at 173 acres and now at 50% containment. Lt. Collins confirmed that good progress was being made on the fire and Cohasset was still in no danger. Things were definitely looking up for both the Graham Fire and the Communities of Cohasset and Campbellville. At 5:34pm on Wednesday June 15, Lassen National Forest posted that the Graham Fire was holding at 175 acres with 70% containment! Thursday, June 15, the news we had all been waiting for was posted: Final Update – 100% Containment.

Our wonderful communities had once again dodged the bullet. However now is not the time to let our guards down. We have months to go before our late October/early November rains come in. So, continue to clean up your properties, especially the areas right around your homes. Keep your Go Bags packed and where you can easily grab them. If you don't have GMRS radios, consider getting them. A good 80-85% of the information on this fire, and on the lightning tree strike Buck fire on the 17th, came from our Cohasset GMRS group. Please contact me for more information at 530-345-1535. Being a landline, texts won't work.
